#### Healthy Families Mountain State

The TEAM entered its 26th year of providing support to families who are pregnant or parenting small children and offering them the voluntary home visitation services of Healthy Families Mountain State.

During this past year, Healthy Families Mountain State continued providing the screening, assessment and referral system for expectant women and new parents. In FY22, those challenges continued to be exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite this obstacle, home visitors served 244 families, facilitating 3,317 home visits both in person and virtual.

#### Western Regional CASA

During this year, 96 CASA volunteers advocated for 553 abused or neglected children in our 10-county area. 21 of those volunteers were newly trained this year in core model CASA advocacy. Our CASA volunteers donated 3830 hours (valued at \$115,000) as they advocated for the best interests of CASA children.

Western Regional CASA piloted a new post-permanency program , *Follow Up to Permanency*. This project offers support to permanent families for up to one year after the court case is closed. Email us at: westernregionalcasa@teamwv.org



## West Virginia Infant/Toddler Mental Health Association

The promotion of infant mental health practices and professional development are two important facets of the work of the West Virginia Infant/Toddler Mental Health Association. During the past year, the Association connected over 400 people to professional development opportunities and developed a branded social media campaign that has attracted over 7200 views. Throughout the past few years, the critical importance of nurturing relationships was amplified, highlighting the need for healthy social emotional

development for ALL West Virginia children and families. It has 150 members and has endorsed 64 people with 17 more in process. The Association began a year-long campaign of social media posts on topics including nurturing interactions, brain

development, supporting caregivers, encouraging young children, reading, outside play, traumatic stress, and breastfeeding.



West Virginia Infant/Toddler Mental Health Association Supporting the social and emotional well being of children

The Association created and hosted a week-long series of webinars on supporting children and families while building relationships. It works always around Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. The Association purchased and personalized an Emergency Preparedness booklet and also shared resources on the trauma experienced by children during conflict and war.

### Partners in Community Outreach

The Partners in Community Outreach Training Specialist offered professional development to In-Home Family Education sites on topics such as Healthy Pregnancy, C-Section — Why, How and Recovery, Understanding How Adolescent Development Affects Teen Pregnancy, Family Planning and Birth Control, Recognizing and Sharing Strengths, Understanding How Trauma Can Affect the Brain, Building a Strong Home Visiting Program. 16 In-Home Family Education sites received training and technical assistance stipends for training opportunities, mentoring, and becoming peer reviewers. Programs began conversations with Congressional delegation about the reauthorization of Federal Maternal Infant Early Childhood Home Visiting funding.

The NEAR@Home Project was kicked off in FY22 and is funded by the St.



Joseph Health and Wellness Foundation. Two Supervisor Academies were held. Feedback: Enjoyed exploring new ideas for our program. Ideas we can implement now & ideas we can think on & ways to make those happen.

#### Prevent Child Abuse West Virginia

The National Child Abuse Prevention Month theme was "Growing a Better Tomorrow for All Children. Together." The garden metaphor of planting a pinwheel garden reinforces the message that every day, we can help families and children thrive.

The Partners in Prevention (PIP) Initiative awards minigrants to fund projects in communities that focus on building Protective factors. The community teams operate in 42 counties across the state. PIP teams served 18,999 people and trained 4,201 individuals. Examples of community projects include community baby showers, diaper pantries, support groups, food drives, mobile food pantries, resource fairs and educational materials distribution. **Circle of Parents West Virginia** are parent-led self-help groups where parents and caregivers share ideas, celebrate successes, and address the challenges surrounding parenting. 15 organizations sponsored 24 groups, conducting 155 meetings and serving 314 parents and 156 children through in-person and virtual meetings.

**Our Babies: Safe and Sound** maintained a partnership with 22 birthing hospitals in WV, as well as 34 early childhood home visitation programs. 36,843 materials were distributed to parents and caregivers on infant safe sleep and preventing Shaken Baby Syndrome.
